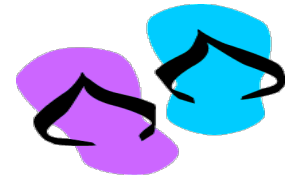




# CHANCLA TOSS CONTEST



1. Two (2) categories 12-17, and 18 +.
2. Participants acknowledge there may be a RISK of INJURY in participation of Chancla Toss.

**\*\*Individuals Participate At Their Own Risk\*\***

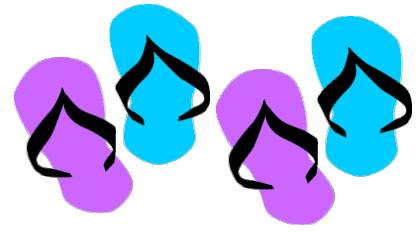
## General Rules

1. Participants are given two practice attempts before the start of qualifying round of 6 tosses.
2. The participant must let the attendant know when he/she is ready to begin.
3. The count begins when the first throw is made.
4. All throws must be attempted from behind the throw line (15 feet).
5. A throw is considered “thrown” when Chancla leaves hand in forward motion.
6. Participants who make 3 or more free throws in the first round will qualify for the final round.
7. Two practice attempts are allowed before the final round begins.
8. The individual championship will be determined by the contestant with the most successful tosses through the cornhole.
